KISS AND TELL

here was a deluge of letters following my recent condemnation of Stan Lee's decision to publish the KISS comic book and I can report an unprecedented outburst of almost total unanimity. Most letters, whether they were addressed to this column or to the Warren letter pages, told me where to get off. The KISS army, as they called themselves, vehemently defended their heroes and wasted no words in their unrelenting attack on my opinion.
