TOWN ELECTIONS 1963

The candidates for the Civic Electors Association, Richard Fowler and Ed Powell, were the big winners in this election. In comparison with last year's town election, it is remarkable that at both times a newcomer led the polls - John deBruijn in 1962 and now Richard Fowler. The turnout at this election was disappointing considering the beautiful fall weather with bright sunshine all day. The new council will have a very busy program for 1963-64 and we wish them all the best success of this coming year. Now the elections are over, we hope that the campaigning heat has cooled off and that all of us will get down to work, supporting our Council and School Boards to make our town a place of which to be proud.

The St. Albert Voters Association, with Gordon Parkes and Alex Soltanoych as running candidates for Council couldn't bring in a victory, although Gordon Parkes took a solid 3rd place and topped the polls in Grandin Park. Independent Denis Heffring was at the bottom of the list, which was a little surprising to many citizens after his very active campaign. Not too many citizens knew him, which may have influenced the result.

Supporters of the Public School Board elected two newcomers, Mrs. Sarah Ross and Dr. Walter Minlin, who took the seats from Adrien Hebert and Ben Schlereth. We wish these two new members all success for their so-important work in the educational field. We are really pleased that a lady has entered one of our public bodies, especially since Sarah Ross has lived so many years in our town (31 years). She knows so much about our town life and activities that her membership on the Public School Board will be a great asset for all the town. We have always stressed the necessity that a woman should enter one or more of the governing public bodies because there are problems not only for boys and men, but also many for girls and women. And who can better understand, advise and solve these problems, than a woman herself! All the best Mrs. Ross, and maybe next year more women will feel that a woman representative on the Council is desirable. Derek Broome will not come back on the Separate School Board. He lost this election by a small margin. George Walker, the town's consulting engineer, entered as a newcomer. He has had much experience in the development of our town. Dr. Wm. Cuts came back with a safe backing of his Protestant voters. His experience has counted for many supporters. For these two winners, our best wishes for the tasks which face them in the future.

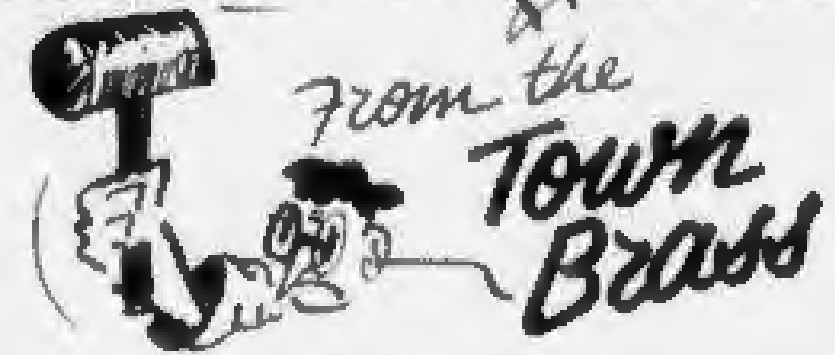

Dear Sir,
Regarding the explanatory letter written by Dr. Schwarz published in the October 15 Gazette, I would like to comment as follows:

"Congratulations Dr. Schwarz, for standing up with courage to your convictions!" To those sinless few who judge some of the hypocrites attending church - please give me your recipe for perfection. I find the more I learn to understand God the more I love Him. I go to church to learn more of Him, in order to serve Him better. I have a feeling that is what the rest of the people attending church are doing. They admit they don't know it all either. We are all of us searching for the Truth that makes and keeps us Free.

This school system situation is a shocking eye opener to me. I simply took for granted ours was a Christian Protestant school system, that was never intended to be merely a non-Catholic institution. What have our fore-fathers for generations fought for - Spiritual Death? Let us not insult our own intelligence. I was always inclined to believe all parents were deeply grateful for any spiritual furthering given their offspring which they themselves were unable or unwilling to give. It distresses me to think there are those who would endorse such a system by which religion being taught in our schools will be destroyed or prohibited. Surely, if we love our children, this benefit will not be denied them; we will rather promote and strive for Christian education, as do the Catholic Separate Schools, and our Christian Protestant schools, some of which are supported by various churches.

It is both disconcerting and depressing to know there are those in favour of "spiritual starvation" in our school system; especially when our young people are in such great need in these difficult times of warfare, communism, etc. Are we not going to give them something to look up to?

Were we all thankful for the progress made in the entire universe because of the coming and death of Christ, we would I am sure, search our inner selves, and give more serious thought to our opinion before we hurl angry accusations at one person who stands firm on his integrity to preserve for our children - not his - but ours, a higher elevation of thought and of life than that found in non-religious organizations. I wonder how many Russians like living in Russia, where they are absolutely forbidden freedom (1) to worship, (2) progress by their individual desire to do so, or even (3) think and speak as they wish.

I personally thank Dr. Schwarz for his Christian endeavour in the school body, our community, and for his unending ef-

Dear Sir,
It was with some interest that I read the recent correspondence concerning the election of members to your Protestant School Board. Firstly, may I commend Dr Schwarz for raising the voice of the Church, where it is so oftensilent on public and moral issues. This may come as a shock to some people, but surely no body has more right to speak than the Church on issues of right and wrong, truth and falsehood, the issues that concern public and private morality. The critical correspondents show surprising ignorance as they present several erroneous and naive ideas both about the foundations of the Canadian Educational Systems, the purposes of the Christian Church and its nature, and even in this

enlightened age, about the fundamentals of democracy. According to the 1961 census some 98% of the families in your community claim an affiliation with some Church. It seems reasonable to expect that a member of your school board should at least be in sympathy with the nature of the community that would elect him to public office, and have some responsibility in the important field of education (which is more than the three R's incidentally - ask any teacher). Mrs. Helen Taylor and Mrs. Doreen Forbes suggest that these ideas foster rifts and emphasize differences. Rifts between who? The 98% who claim a church and the 2% who don't, or between Catholic and Protestant? (It is certainly not with our Roman Catholic brethren who have never lost sight of the importance of the Christian emphasis in public education, which we so often ignore, and which has been so timely pointed out in Dr. Schwarz's letter.) I also detect a note that would suggest that the living of a moral, honest life is to be given as the full definition of the Christian, a misconception commonly held by many. They should be informed

that the Church exists as a hospital for sinners and not a museum for saints. I must confess to being a snob - a snob about snobs, looking down on people who look down on people. I hope our mistaken but sincere writers are not looking down on the poor sinners that attend church. Nowhere in the Bible can I find a single place where Jesus forgave the Pharisees, the honest and good living, but oh, so self-righteous folk. A speaker from Bowden recently informed a public gathering in Edmonton that only twenty-five boys out of the large number that have now been placed in the Bowden Institute through the years, have ever had any religious training. It seems rather odd that parents, who normally want the best for their children should, like Mr. Walker, seek to remove such an important part of their education from even public mention. However, this is an age when we elect those notorious for previous gross public misconduct to high office, appoint known gangsters to organize our labour unions, and put business failures in charge of public finances, so perhaps it is not too much out of harmony that we should elect those who would ridicule God and Christian faith to key positions where the moral life of our children is

concerned.

Dear Sir,

There are some points of misunderstanding and error in two of last week's letters that require answering. First, that this school system is for "everyone" This is not so, according to the school regulations in Alberta. Public schools are for everyone who does not agree with the objects of the Separate Schools that are organized. Further, one letter suggested that monetary reasons alone were behind this system and this is less than flattering to the concerned parents who established the system so that their children could have an education in a Protestant context. Second, it was suggested that a close association exists between my church and the school board. This is utter nonsense and would have been recognized as such by the writers if they had checked the facts. Of five members on the last school board, only one is a member, regular attender and supporter of my church, and one other is

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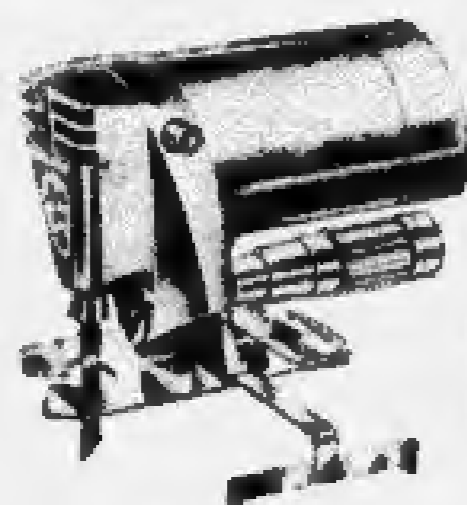
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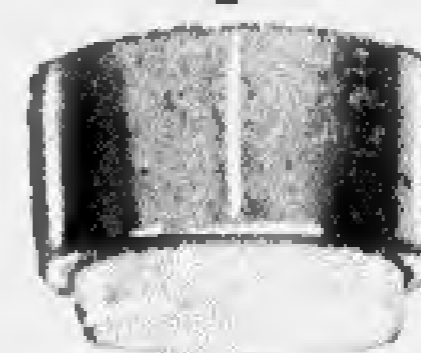

an adherent who attends regularly and supports the work. Where in this can the "close association" or influence be? Third, it was suggested that religion should be kept out of the schools. School is a preparation for life. Life is involved with values. Religion is concerned with values or "worths". The word "worship" comes in part from this, it is the giving of the place of worth to God. Other things have been given the place of worth in society at various times with tragic results; for example, the state (this led to the Buchenwalds and the murder of millions in the interest of the state), race (and this has led to the native reserves in South Africa and dead children in the ruins of a Birmingham, Alabama church in the interest of the race), and social class (with resulting purges and Siberian labour camps). It is hard to envisage any of these things in our community, but so it must also have been difficult to envisage them in other communities. I think the values suggested by the Galilean carpenter have much to offer in contrast and I think they have a definite place in the school. And finally, it is said that I am promoting differences in the community. Is this to say that I promote an awareness of the differences between those of Christian conviction and those who are not, I agree. We should never lose sight of what the Christian stands for in the face of non-religion. However, to say that dividing the community is a general policy with me indicates that the writers do not know that the intent of our congregation is to be, first Christian, second Protestant, and third to reflect the denominational traditions of the people who worship in the church. Fine words, you say, but does it work? I think the answer to this and the charge that I promote differences between people lies in the fact that people from some two dozen traditions within the Christian Church gather under one roof for worship.

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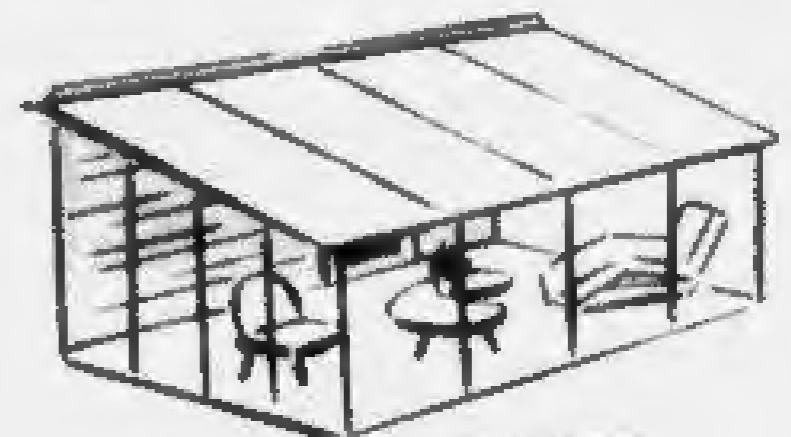


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COMMUNITY HALL NO FIRE TRAP

It is the intention of the Town of St. Albert to re-subdivide, by means of a replotting scheme, certain properties backing onto the Sturgeon River, between Highway No. 2 and St. Alphonse Street. This scheme would involve the closing of St. Alphonse Street and would create a 15 foot walkway from Mission Avenue to the river, and a park strip of approximately 20 feet along the river throughout the land being re-subdivided.

The owners of the properties concerned have approved the proposed replotting scheme, however, it is felt that the proposal should be advertised so that any persons who might wish to object to the proposal may have the opportunity to do so.

Any objections should be made in writing and should be mailed or delivered so as to be in the Town Hall by 12:00 Noon, on Thursday, October 31st, 1963.

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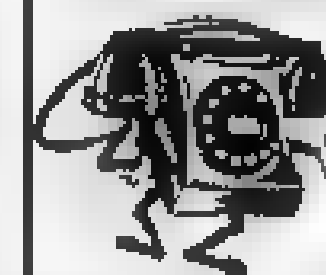
